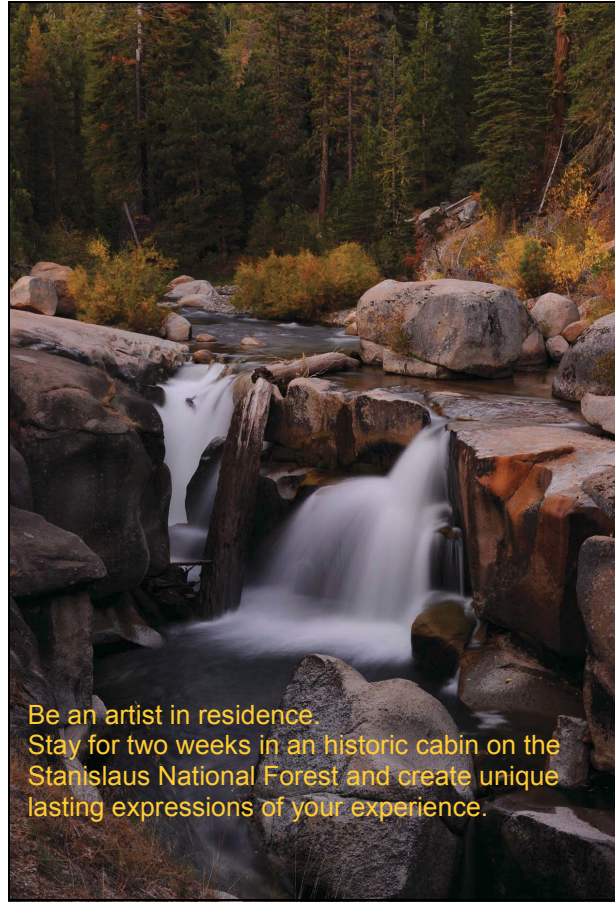
No Significant Impact for the Ahwahnee Comprehensive Rehabilitation Plan

Yosemite National Park announces the signing of The Ahwahnee Comprehensive Rehabilitation Plan Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI). The FONSI records the decision of the National Park Service to adopt a long-term plan for the rehabilitation of The Ahwahnee (described as Alternative 3 in environmental assessment released for public review in July 2011). The

FONSI, environmental assessment, and errata sheets are available at: <http://parkplanning.nps.gov/AhwahneeRehab>.

The Selected Action addresses code and standard deficiencies (e.g., fire, seismic, life-safety, health, accessibility) and rehabilitates historic features throughout the National Historic Landmark hotel and cottages. The Selected

Action also improves operational and energy and water-use efficiencies to provide a sustainable level of service into the future for both overnight and daytime visitors. The park will imple-

ment the comprehensive rehabilitation plan in a long-term, phased approach as funding becomes available. A public scoping period for The Ahwahnee Comprehensive Rehabilitation Plan occurred from August 13 through September 30, 2009. Targeted scoping to museums, historical societies and preservation groups also occurred in January 2010. Eight public scoping letters were received and considered by park staff.

The environmental assessment was released for public review on July 21, 2011, and the National Park Service accepted comments through August 23, 2011. Eight public comment letters were received. All comments on the EA were reviewed by park staff and were considered in the development of the FONSI and errata sheets.

Just How Safe is Hunting

I have been avid outdoors type most of my life and got started in the shooting sports at a very young age. Starting with archery in my pre-teens shooting bales of hay in moms back yard. A bit later I picked up shooting clays with high school friends at a local range and my first hunting experience was with my younger brother Tom. Through an archery shop, we went squirrel hunting with about 15 others.

Later, another brother Dan, joined us and just about every weekend the three of us would go around to different archery ranges practicing, competing and ribbing each other the whole day through.

We even joined a hunting ranch for awhile and met some of the neatest people from just about everywhere it seemed, all with the same passion for the shooting sports and the outdoors. The only injury anyone got was from exhaustion from the days hunt, climbing hills, walking trails or the hurt pride because the "one that got away" was this big... and that story was usually told around the camp fire everyone shared at the end of the day laughing and reminiscing, eager to do it all again the next morning.

Today, I'm an archery instructor and working on my Hunter Education certification. I donate time to the California Deer Assoc and the Women & Kids day events where shooting archery and rifles can be taught in a safe and controlled environment.

In a recent Press release from the National Shooting Sports Foundation, Inc (NSSF) relating injuries to sports activities, their findings may be very different than what you might think.

Hunting is Safer than Golf and most other activities. You can visit NSSF.Org to view their report but here are some of the findings:

Hunting Versus other activities:

A person is **11 times** more likely to be injured playing volleyball than hunting, A person is **25 times** more likely to be injured cheerleading or bicycle riding than hunting,

A person is **34 times** more likely to be injured playing soccer or skateboarding than hunting,

A person is **105 times** more likely to be injured playing tackle football than hunting.

Whether you enjoy Archery, target shooting, plinking or lawn darts, take the family and bring your friends. Share the experience of being outdoors. 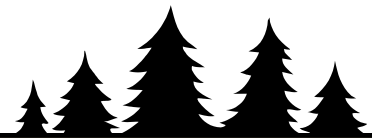

February 2012 Supervisor Article

I can't believe that we are already into the second month of 2012. My year as Chairman is over. I have enjoyed the challenge but I'm happy to pass the gavel to fellow Board Member, Dick Pland. The gavel is in good hands. This will be Dick's last year, as a Supervisor for Tuolumne County. After nearly 16 years of service, Dick has decided not to run for a fifth term. We will miss him. He has been a great mentor to me and an outstanding advocate for the people of Tuolumne County.

The Board adopted the 2012 Legislative Platform at the January 3rd Board Meeting. This is the second year that the Board has established a formal bipartisan platform to try to influence State and Federal Legislative Process. It is the Boards' unanimous opinion that we must walk together to help reform policies that are detrimental to county operations. The entire list can be found on the County's web page: www.tuolumne.ca.us.gov

The Board has also adopted its 2012 Goals. This is the 3rd year in which we have agreed as a Board that we need goals in place that are "achievable" and well thought out. As you may recall, we conducted outreach meetings with the public to develop a 5 Year Plan. The goals for 2012 reflect that 5 Year Plan. A list of the 2012 goals can also be found on the County's web page.

On January 19th, the Board will have conducted a second Special Board Meeting and Forum dealing with economic development. In 2008 when the

City of Sonora and Tuolumne County established the Tuolumne County Economic Development Authority, the top priority elements of that vision were as follow:

- Realize a revitalized economic development organization
- Secure sustainable funding
- Promote and encourage community support through effective education and communication
- Leverage inventory of assets and needs and the marketing of assets
- Business assistance program
- Necessary infrastructure to implement the vision

One of the key components of this Boards' recently adopted 5 Year Plan was to ask California Economic Development (CALED) to come back and conduct a follow-up forum aimed at: (1) evaluating how well the County and community have moved to address the key elements identified in 2008 (2) determining which of the 2008 elements require additional action; and (3) deciding on new elements to focus on economic development in the county's future.

The final report of the Forum will be placed on the Tuolumne County Economic Development Authority web page.

I wish that I could supply some good news concerning the State Responsibility Area (SRA) fee. It's still alive and changing as I write. This fee was originally designed to provide funds necessary to take fire preventive measures. Now, this same fee is being defined as a way of funding Cal Fire. Sometimes I wonder if it's also designed to punish rural counties for not supporting the Governor in his election. (Probably

just my conspiracy theory section working... but when you try to sort through the reasoning, it's kind of hard to understand why it was developed).

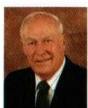
The Sheriff and County Staff are working diligently to implement AB109 that directs the release of "low risk" prisoners from the State to the County's responsibility. AB109 is much too complicated to explain in a short article. Essentially, we must have a way of managing the prisoners that have been released in our area. The major problem that faces Tuolumne County is that our jail is already filled to capacity. If those individuals have to be placed in our jail there is very limited space in which to meet this requirement. This means that we must monitor inmates differently and release other low-risk prisoners that we already have in our jail.

For more than 20 years Tuolumne County has been addressing the necessity for a jail with more cells. Multiple Grand Juries have identified and reported this need but we have continued to "kick the can down the road" until we can no longer ignore the condition.

At our January 3rd meeting, the Board of Supervisors voted to make an effort to secure a State Grant in the amount of \$33M for jail construction. It is anticipated that the funds required to build a facility in a size sufficient to satisfy the need will be nearly \$48M. Although a staggering figure, this \$48M is nearly **\$40M less** than the estimated cost figure in 2008. That in itself may be good news; however, there is still a funding gap of approximately \$15M.

AB109 has heightened the issue. We see "early release" into communities

tied to a managed monitoring system for some and the transfer or reintroduction into county jails for others who were formerly housed in state facilities. This makes us even more aware of the situation at hand.

I want to go on record now to say that I support the need for a new jail. I stated a number of times when running for the position of 4th District Supervisor that a new jail should be a top priority. Sad to say, but certain people just "don't get it". Without the ultimate punishment of incarceration as a deterrent for bad behavior, criminals will continue their unsavory ways.

More information to come on this project in the months ahead.

In closing, I would like to give "kudos" to one of the South County's waste management companies, Moore Brothers. If you have been following the progress of the County's recycling program developed over the past 4 years, you will appreciate that there has been a considerable cooperative effort by the County and the Garbage Franchise holder to work out a recycling program that would fit the need in the various geographic areas.

The plan developed by Moore Brothers has benefited its customers in that it was implemented without requiring a large rate increase as has happened in other areas. This is a significant consideration during tough economic times. As with any enterprise, it's difficult to maintain a constant fee when companies are faced with increasing costs. Moore Brothers has been able to do this with minimal impact on the customer.

The Franco family grew vegetables, apples, cherries and grapes and made wine which they sold to the local populace. Johnny Franco did much of the masonry on the home and for several

other homes in the area. He also worked as a butcher in Sal Ferretti's butcher shop during the Hetch Hetchy Dam building years.
